3. Scripture Easter Egg Hunt

Still have some plastic Easter eggs? Kids love scavenger hunts. Why not create an Easter Egg hunt that teaches the story of Easter? Here's what to do:

- Draw symbols on small pieces of paper to be placed in plastic Easter eggs as follows: sunrise, rock, guards/soldiers, Women, angel, men running, balloons, flowers, heart, folded blanket
- place the symbols in plastic Easter eggs (you can have multiple copies of each symbol depending on how long you want the hunt to last and how many children are looking) If you are really nice, you can add a piece of candy in with the heart symbol or with all of them.
- Hide the eggs
- Hunt!
- After you have found all the symbols try to put them in order to tell the story. Use your Bible to help.
