WORDS OF BLESSING AND ASSURANCE



GOSPEL LESSON Luke 12:13-21

¹³ Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me." ¹⁴ But he said to him, "Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?" ¹⁵ And he said to them, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." ¹⁶ Then he told them a parable: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. ¹⁷ And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' ¹⁸ Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. ¹⁹ And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' ²⁰ But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' ²¹ So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God."

EPISTLE LESSON 1 Timothy 6:6-19

⁶Of course, there is great gain in godliness combined with contentment; ⁷ for we brought nothing into the world, so that we can take nothing out of it; ⁸ but if we have food and clothing, we will be content with these. ⁹ But those who want to be rich fall into temptation and are trapped by many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. ¹⁰ For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, and in their eagerness to be rich some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pains. ¹¹ But as for you, man of God, shun all this; pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. ¹² Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life, to which you were called and for which you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses. ¹³ In the presence of God, who gives life to all things, and of Christ Jesus, who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you ¹⁴ to keep the commandment without spot or blame until the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ, ¹⁵ which he will bring about at the right time—he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. ¹⁶ It is he alone who has immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see; to him be honor and eternal dominion. Amen.

¹⁷ As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. ¹⁸ They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, ¹⁹ thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.

SERMON What Makes for a Good Day?

What is your definition of a good day? Here are some answers I received from our congregation when I posed this question.

Walter C: When you're heading towards 82, a good day is just waking up. But if I wake up then a good day starts with a good cup of coffee, eggs and bacon – ok, a little toast and jelly. Sunny day required and then I go

out and play with my 100+ conifers, 100+ hostas, etc...in other words, play in the garden...that would be God's garden.

Linda B.: "I was very concerned about my 21 year-old cat today when I found evidence something was very wrong in her litter box. The vet got her right in and assured me that older cats often have this issue and gave her an antibiotic. Also, the growth on the side of her neck (that I had previously been told was cancerous) was a type of tumor that although a real problem for dogs seemed not to cause real damage in cats. I had been putting a product on it a friend recommended and it seemed to be breaking apart. She assured me that it was only in the skin. The other growths she has previously had have disappeared. I was so afraid I'd be told it was time to put her down. Instead, I got all this good news and as I was standing in the vet's parking lot the most glorious, orange and pink sunset appeared. It was like God was celebrating with me!!!"

Brad S.: "I am working on finishing stuff up here at the office so I can get to the polls and vote. But this email intrigued me... your question "What is a good day?" and you mentioned the wind whipping through... it made me think.

My morning started off rough today. This whipping wind tore down our backyard pool that I thought was winterized and spent hours setting up. This morning I spent almost two hours cleaning it up and setting it back up again... as the wind continued to blow hard and moving the tarp around while I tried to tie and clamp it down. I found myself being mad at God. Yeah, I know it's crazy... but I am like "come on God, can you please just stop the wind for a few moments so I can tie down this tarp?" After almost two hours, I finally secured the tarp... I thought that was a waste of time... I gotta get to the office get my work done...so I can leave early and vote.

On my way into the office, I got pulled over... no, no I was not speeding... that would make sense... but I just got a "new to me" car last Wednesday and the registration was still not up to date. The Officer was really kind of cool... I just have to call him once my registration comes in to confirm that everything is good. (btw the DMV is a little behind according to the dealership).

I feel like I should be upset... (I was upset at 7:15am fixing the pool tarp)... but, I am really not at the moment... God works in amazing ways sometimes (all the time). Even though I didn't feel like God was with me as the wind whipped through my backyard this morning making it very difficult to secure this crazy flapping tarp... I know he was there... teaching me to be patient and chill out.

Life is crazy, especially now during this Covid time, virtual education, etc...and now with the pool situation and getting pulled over made my day even more crazy. Just writing this email has been a good release. Even when things don't go exactly as planned and you feel you've learned something about yourself... I chalk that up to being a good day."

Sue H.: "A good day to me is on the beach. We drive onto the beach...unload our chairs, umbrellas, table...I then go shelling and looking for sea glass...I try to pick up only whole shells, because I already have MANY shells at my house. Finding any type of sea glass is very exciting!!!! I also pray when I look for shells and sea glass. I do pray to find a piece of sea glass...but I also pray for all the people and circumstances on my prayer list. I always feel so close to God at the beach.

I go back to the truck and sit under the umbrella and read. When I get hungry, we have a portable grill that we grill hot dogs on...nothing like a hot dog on the beach.

Then I would go shelling again...then I would read and when the water gets close to the truck tires...it's time to leave...but there is always the next day at the beach!!!"

Pat G.: "I was out all morning and just opened my email. Your question stopped me in my tracks, and I have been thinking about my definition.

My good day is defined by a lot of little things, and I try to be mindful of them. I enjoy the wonderful feeling of water in the shower. I pay attention to the food when I'm eating. There is something to be accomplished each day - even if it is as simple as cleaning my room or scrubbing the tub. Connecting with people by phone, email, or in person adds "very" to the good. And I take time at the end of the day to express my gratitude to God."

Bill M.: "Today is Earl of Sandwich day, 11/3. He was playing poker and did not want to break for dinner so he asked to have his meat in between 2 pieces of bread.

A good day for me is having a sandwich of meatloaf that my wife made with a glass of Chianti. She is the best!!! What more would a guy want?"

Paul W.: "My idea of a good day is everything went as planned on the job, I got paid and I didn't get hurt doing it!!"

Carol E.: "Last Christmas we had the joy of having our son and his family here. They had moved to Pennsylvania from Florida the summer before. It gave us the chance to see them all, but especially our great grandson, Ryan, whom we had not seen in almost three years. He and his mother are still living in Florida. We shared all the good things, food, memories and laughter. Many pictures were taken. Games were played and much love was shared. As they were leaving and we were waving goodbye, Ryan said to all in the car "What a good day!" This from the mouth of a four year old. We should all take a lesson from him.

No one will ever forget the time that we are in right now. And when this world is better, I pray we can learn not to take the small things for granted ever again. Hopefully, we can make every day a good day."

In today's Epistle lesson, Paul, through Timothy, is giving advice for all God's people. It was written to give warnings about false teaching. Timothy was in the city of Ephesus tending to the church which Paul started. It was an ancient port city whose well-preserved ruins are in modern-day Turkey. The city was once considered the most important Greek city and the most important trading center in the Mediterranean region. This would then imply that there was considerable wealth in that area as well as influence that reached beyond their borders.

The counsel that Paul provides in today's passage is basically concerning what constitutes not just a good day, but also a good life when he instructs Timothy to tell the wealthy of the community to..."go after God, who piles on all the riches we could ever manage—to do good, to be rich in helping others, to be extravagantly generous. If they do that, they'll build a treasury that will last, gaining life that is truly life."

Did you notice anything in the descriptions of a good day that I received from some of you? Not one of them said that a good day was winning the lottery, the stock market being up five hundred points, getting money back from the IRS, or collecting \$200 for doing nothing more than passing "Go." Not that any of these are bad in and of themselves or wouldn't make you happy on any given day, but none of them appeared in your reflections.

When I asked you to describe a "good day," you said things like love received and given, connecting with God through simple God-given things, protection, and peace. I have to say that when I read your responses, I was inspired and blessed by the presence of God. You spoke the words of Paul so beautifully and better than anything I could have said.

As I said, Paul wrote this letter to counter false teachings. These included what it takes to have a full and worthwhile life – good days all your days. The prosperous community of Ephesus believed, as many with considerable wealth believe, that wealth, material goods will bring you the happy good life you so greatly desire.

E. Stanley Jones was about to go across a street. A woman pulled on his arm and said, "Look at the red light." Jones replied rather weakly, "But look at the people going across." She replied, "Don't look at them. Look at the light and follow it." That's the advice Paul was passing on. Don't follow what others may be thinking and doing that may seem alright but in fact are not. Many of us are content to watch other people and to do as they do losing sight of what is important and right.

Fredrick Buechner, "There are people who use up their entire lives making money so they can enjoy the lives they have entirely used up."

Jesus said that it's easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of God. Maybe the reason is not that the rich are so wicked they're kept out of the place but that they're so out of touch with reality that they can't see it's a place worth getting into."

Paul says that the place that is worth getting to is the kingdom of God. As followers of Jesus we are to be in this world but not of it, not of the mindset that so much seems to be a part of our society that is all "me, myself and I. It is so much about revenge, suspicion and division. I'm right, you're wrong. I'm good, you're bad. God's kingdom is all about "we," peace, justice, forgiveness, compassion, and joy in the Lord's abundant good gifts. You don't get there through the accumulation of "stuff" and wealth but rather through doing good, helping and loving others, and being extravagantly generous by sharing what God has given you. I believe that is what you all defined as a good day which is much different than the foolish rich man's definition.

In her song, "Soak up the Sun," singer Sheryl Crow says, "I don't have digital, I don't have diddly squat. It's not having what you want, it's wanting what you've got." In other words we don't have to run after stuff, but God has already given us all that we need through our time, talent and treasure and if we use them as Paul describes and as Jesus taught, then we will provide for our present that will take us into a good future. It is what stewardship is all about – appreciating our gifts and using them for our own good and for the good of all creation.

Think about it. How would you define a good day? This is what God wills for you and all of creation, we just need to get our priorities straight and, with God's help, we can make it happen so that we can all have the life that is truly life -a good day, a good life.
