Pastor's Notes

"Now we see as if we are looking into a dark mirror. But at that time, in the future, we shall see clearly. Now I know only a part. But at that time I will know fully, as God has known me." -- 1 Corinthians 13:12

Recently I had my first cataract surgery – on my left eye. In anticipation of that procedure, many who have shared that experience told me of their results. Most proclaimed a remarkable difference in their vision. Suddenly they could see brighter and clearer than ever before. It was likened to a miracle.

That wasn't exactly my experience. I came away blurry whether wearing my glasses or not. My brain was trying to adjust to having dramatically different vision capabilities between my two eyes. Slowly, the "good eye" has been taking over and I look forward to my right eye undergoing the transformative surgery.

As I reflect on my reality I am put in mind of the season we are entering into – Advent. During these next four weeks we anticipate the celebration of the Incarnation of God's own Son. As the ancients awaited God's fulfillment of the promised Messiah, they had high expectations of the One who would come to free them from all ills and oppression. It would be heaven on earth.

Alas, the reality wasn't so. An infant born to poor peasants with lowclass and foreign visitors. But with God's choice, a new reality did enter the world, one that they and we can see dimly – of God's vindication and Divine Will come to earth where there is peace (shalom) on earth.

Advent is a time to look back to what once happened long ago, but also what is yet to come, the fulfillment of God's new creation. We can only see a dim and blurry vision of what that will be as we look to the ministry and teachings of Jesus. The day will come when we will see clearly, when our vision will be unobstructed and God ushers in a new era of peace and wholeness. Until then, even our blurry vision can give us hope that God is working God's purpose out. It is hard to wait, but so worth it. This Advent, I hope you look for the clear reality of God at work, even if in the meantime you have to put on glasses of faith, because God is at work – when the poor are provided for, the sick are ministered to, the hungry are fed, the outcast are included, and justice is done. There is hope and joy and peace and love all around us even in the smallest of ways. We just have to see it.




Congratulations Samuel Holton


