PASTOR NOTES

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, do that everyone who believes in him may not parish but may have eternal life." – John 3:16

There are few verses in the Bible as familiar as John 3:16. It is boldly displayed at football games, billboards, t-shirts and cards. Martin Luther referred to it as "the heart of the Bible, the Gospel in miniature."

Reference to its being the "heart" of the gospel seems most appropriate as it speaks of God's everlasting love that prompted the greatest gift of all time in the incarnation of God's only begotten Son, Jesus, who gave himself up for our sake.

We will start our Lenten journey this month as we walk with Jesus toward the cross and our salvation. How appropriate that it should fall in the month associated with love and this year, we begin our journey on the day set aside for the recognition and celebration of love, Valentine's Day. Yes, February 14th is also (maybe more importantly) Ash Wednesday when we receive our ashes as a reminder that from dust we came and to dust we shall return. But, thank God, dust we do not remain, thanks to the forgiveness of sin made possible through Jesus' death and resurrection. Now we are engrafted into Christ and this supreme gift so that through faith we receive eternal life.

This February 14th, as you honor and share love with your beloved, take time to praise and worship the One who calls us beloved. Please note the article in this newsletter about the service that will be offered on Ash Wednesday.

As the prophet Isaiah has declared, we are inscribed on the palm of God's hand and as a mother cannot forget her nursing child, so we are not forgotten. Now that's love!

Ash Wednesday

February 14, 2024

This year we will be holding the Ash Wednesday service at 11:30 AM on February 14. If you are unable to attend that service but would like to receive ashes, please contact Pastor Su.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. It's official name is "Day of Ashes," so called because of the practice of rubbing ashes on one's forehead in the sign of the cross. These ashes are made from the previous year's palms used on Palm Sunday.

In the Old Testament a person would cover themselves with ashes as a sign of mourning expressing remorse, sorrow, lowliness, and humility. King David wore ashes after his illegitimate son died, a sign that he was mourning the loss but also that he was sorry for the sin he had committed in conceiving the child with Bathsheba.

Genesis states: "From dust we came and to dust we shall return." Ashes are dust, reminding us of our mortality and God's gift of life through Jesus Christ.

During Lent, we focus on our own mortality and sinfulness. Beginning with Ash Wednesday, when we come forward to receive ashes, we are saying that we are sorry for our sins and that we want to use the season of Lent to correct our faults, purify our hearts, control our desires and grow in holiness so we will be prepared to celebrate Easter with great joy.

Lenten Mid-Week Communion



Beginning on February 21, a brief Communion service will be held each Wednesday at 11:30 AM here at the church. These worship opportunities have been a regular part of our Lenten observation for many years. It's a great mid-week pause to connect with God during this time of contemplation. If you are able, plan to remain after the service for a brown bag lunch and fellowship.



We are off to a New Year at Youth Group but have the same purpose – to grow in faith through fellowship, activities and teachings. In February this will include Bowling at Thunderbird lanes on the 4th, making pancakes for the church Pancake

Supper during Friday Night Fellowship on the 9^{th} (we start cooking at 5:30 PM). Finally, after taking the week off for President's Weekend, we will come back on February 25^{th} to meet here in the church for a regular evening gathering. It's always a good time at Youth Group. FEBRUARY 9, 2024

It's Mardi Gras Night! Wear your purple, gold and green and come to the church at 6:00 for a pancake supper (the traditional food for the day before Lent), mission and fellowship.

Do you know the meaning behind the Mardi Gras colors? Purple stands for justice. It has also been associated with royalty since antiquity — the Persian king Cyrus wore a purple tunic as his royal uniform, while some Roman emperors even forbade any non-royal from wearing the hue. Its popularity among kings was primarily due to its exclusivity. Derived from a rare sea snail, the coveted "Tyrian purple" took upwards of 250,000 snails to produce just one ounce of dye, making it extraordinarily rare and prohibitively expensive.

Gold stands for power. It has connections to wealth as a precious metal, but its inclusion is also a nod to traditional heraldry, symbols that represent family origin, giving it a color palette that represents the utmost importance.

Green stands for faith. The color has noble associations that similarly extend back to antiquity. The ancient Egyptians were known to paint representations of their gods using malachite, a vibrantly hued green stone. Yet, above all, the color green points to prosperity. Beginning the Middle Ages, the color green was often worn by bankers, merchants and other upper-class families.

Also, when we think of Mardi Gras, we think of masks. Representing freedom from rules and social structures, masks allowed individuals to mingle amongst different classes without damaging one's reputation.

All of these symbols are to mimic the identity and teachings of Jesus.


A special "Thank You" to Rachel Dell'Orefice for her service as a


